Exploring Plant Life Cycles

As part of their inquiry into plant life cycles and growth, the children of **grade** 2 were taken to the **garden for a hands-on learning experience**. They participated in **sowing seeds**, which allowed them to observe the **process of planting firsthand**.

This activity helped them understand the essential conditions for germination, such as **soil**, **water**, **sunlight**, **and warmth**. Over time, the children were able to monitor the germination process and witness the transformation of seeds into seedlings.

They explored how plants grow, including the development of roots, stems, and leaves, fostering their curiosity and knowledge about nature and the environment. This practical experience also encouraged responsibility as they cared for the plants and tracked their progress.

DP CAS Trip to Coorg



From January 16th to 20th, 29 students from DP 1 embarked on a CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service) trip to Coorg, which provided an enriching blend of adventure, cultural exploration, and meaningful service experiences. This trip offered students ample opportunities to engage in all three strands of the CAS program, making it a truly holistic learning journey.

The adventure began with a visit to **Dubare Elephant Camp**, where students had the unique experience of participating in the elephant bathing and **feeding activities.** They also crossed the river on foot, which proved to be both a challenging and refreshing activity, fostering resilience and collaboration among the group.

Following this, students visited the **Namdroling Monastery**, also known as the **Golden Temple.** Immersed in the rich Tibetan Buddhist culture, students marveled at the peaceful surroundings and awe-inspiring architecture. This experience offered them deep insights into **spiritual traditions**, broadening their global perspectives.

A highlight of this visit was the interactive session with a monk from the Sera Jay Monastery, where the **monk addressed the students' meaningful and philosophical questions,** providing thought-provoking responses and a deeper understanding of the philosophy of life. The trip also included an adventurous day of **mountain trekking** through Coorg's lush landscapes. The trek was physically challenging yet rewarding, as students navigated the terrain, **encouraging teamwork, resilience, and endurance.** The trek allowed them to enjoy the **scenic beauty of the Western Ghats** while also learning the value of supporting one another in difficult situations.

One of the most impactful experiences of the trip was the visit to **Swasta Foundation**, an NGO dedicated to supporting individuals with developmental disabilities. During their time at the foundation, students interacted with the children and adults at the center, participating in activities and contributing to the **NGO's projects**. This service experience was both humbling and inspiring, allowing students to make meaningful contributions while gaining a deeper understanding of **community service**, **empathy**, **and the power of human connection**.
